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Thoughts from Bill:

A Study of the Heart

A Godly Father's Heart

Hebrews 11:5-10, 17-18

Today we revisit our study of the spiritual heart or mind of man as we consider a godly father's heart. I hope each father who reads this will strive to be like these godly men.

Godly fathers will have a heart that *pleases God* like Enoch did (Heb. 11:5). Enoch's biography reads like many others because he was born, grew older, married and had children, and he . . . But that is where the similarity between Enoch and others ends because Enoch did not die, he was taken by God (Gen. 5:24). Why? Enoch pleased God because he believed God could and would do what He says (Heb. 11:6).

Godly fathers will have a *righteous and "fearful"* heart

like Noah. Noah was a righteous man who is described as just and perfect. Like his great-grandfather Enoch, he walked with God in a world of evil and unrighteousness (Gen. 6:13). Humanity was spared from destruction because of the faith of Noah who did right even when hardly anyone else did. Peter described Noah as a “preacher of righteousness” (2 Peter 2:5). We need fathers with a heart like Noah’s.

Godly fathers will have a godly heart like Abraham who had a *faithful, obedient, and unselfish heart*. God told Abraham at the age of seventy-five years to leave Ur of the Chaldeans (Gen. 11:31, 12:4) and travel to an unknown destination (Heb. 11:8). Abraham dwelt in tents and waited for a city whose builder and maker was God (Heb. 11:10). Abraham’s faithfulness is seen when he believed God would bless him with a great nation even though his initial reaction was one of doubt and a cause of “drama” on both the part of Abraham and Sarah. God even felt the need to reemphasize His promise to Abraham in Genesis 15:5, and the Bible says in Genesis 15:6: “And he believed in the Lord, and He accounted it to him for righteousness.” When God called Abraham to offer Issac, the child of promise, Abraham unselfishly did that very thing, trusting in God’s power to raise Issac from the dead (Heb. 11:17-19). Fathers, would you have answered the call of God on these occasions with faith, obedience, and unselfishness?

Godly fathers will have a godly heart like Joseph who had a *persevering* heart even in the midst of many disappointments in life, knowing that God had a plan for him (Gen 50:20). Joseph with complete faith knew that God one day would visit the children of Israel and keep His promise to them, and he gave instructions for his bones to be carried out of Egypt when they left (Gen. 50:24-25; Heb. 11:22). Fathers, do you face the injustices and disappointments of life with the right attitude and a willingness to keep on keeping on?

We could talk about other godly fathers like Moses, Joshua,

Job, and so many others who lived lives set apart for God, but these are sufficient.

Fathers, is your heart right with God?
